Corel Honors Sign Artist



SHADOW HILLS, Calif. -Corel Corporation, Ottawa,
Ontario, has named William
Mogensen of Mogensen Design,
Shadow Hills, Calif., as an October winner in the CorelDRAW
World Design Contest.

The World Design Contest is the world's foremost computer art competition. Last year it attracted 3,371 entries from over 30 countries.

Mogensen's Goose Creek entry sign was created entirely in CorelDRAW 3.0 rev.B, except for the geese, which are modified clip art. The illustration took about three hours to complete from concept to print.

"I've been a user of CorelDRAW since 1989 and have found the program to be absolutely incredible," says Mogensen. "The program is so versatile I use it for virtually all of my design-through-production work. Concept drawings, thumbnail sketches, color comps, approval drawings, proposals, presentations, working drawings, screen print positives, color separations,

output files for CADlink and my vinyl cutter... almost everything."

Mogensen has been a sign painter since 1977 and still uses traditional methods when called for. However, he notes, "the computer sure makes it easy and efficient to design signs."

In addition to his sign business, Mogensen is also a systems engineer at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., where he uses CorelDRAW for technical illustration and presentation graphics.
